Glossary of key vocabulary

This is a list of some of the key vocabulary for the learning this term.

Fronted Adverbials words or phrases at the beginning of a sentence, used to add further information (including time, place, frequency and manner) to the action that follows . E.g. Yesterday, we went to the park. Over the bridge, there was a park. Often, we go to the park. Maybe, we can go to the park.

Inverted commas Punctuation used to mark the beginning and end of direct speech. Commonly known as speech marks.

Possessive apostrophe When a apostrophe is added onto the end of a root word before a 's' to show a plural.

Prefixes Letter/s added to the beginning of a root word to change the meaning. For example, unkind, un is the prefix

Adverbs These add information to the verb. E.g. The <u>friendly</u> child Suffixes Letter/s added to the end of a root word to change the meaning. For example, painted, -ed is the suffix

Proper nouns A noun referring to a particular person, place of thing, for example, Sally, London, Tuesday, May. They usually have a capital letter.
